The past year has been a remarkable journey, highlighted by the appointment of Dr. Fred Rundle as the new MISD Superintendent. Driven by his unwavering commitment to student excellence and a focus on prioritizing their needs, we are so pleased to have such an accomplished leader at the helm of our District. Dr. Rundle's unparalleled dedication to students, educators, and schools inspires us all.

This year also marked a pivotal return to normalcy, emerging from a three-year event hiatus due to the challenges of the Covid pandemic. The MISF All in for Kids Phone-A-Thon returned to an in-person format in the fall, uniting our MISF Board of Directors, educators, administrators, volunteers, and an unprecedented number of students. Through these collective efforts, we successfully engaged every Mercer Island School District family, raising an impressive \$520,000.

The generosity of our community enabled the Foundation to award over \$80,000 in teacher enrichment grants. These grants empowered exceptional initiatives, including the We Can All Be Authors program, where professional authors guide 5th-grade classes to write and publish a novel collaboratively. An enriching Orchestra Artist-in-Residence program enhanced students' musical understanding and exposed them to diverse cultural traditions, while Physics students at MIHS gained hands-on experience with alternative energy sources by providing Stirling Engines.

Spring brought the return of our iconic annual fundraiser, the Breakfast of Champions, which celebrated our community's profound impact on our schools. Over 400 individuals, including students, educators, scholarship recipients, and esteemed alums, united to celebrate and financially support our schools, thus bridging critical gaps.

Thanks to our generous community, the Foundation funded over \$600,000 for new texts and resources in MIHS classes like AP Biology, Marine Science, and Human Geography & Climate Impact at IMS and MIHS. Additionally, over \$200,000 funded the Benchmark Advanced Literacy Curricula and iReady Instructional Math Curricula in elementary schools and new Algebra, Geometry, and Algebra II resources at MIHS and IMS.

As you explore the 2022-23 Annual Impact Report, we hope you grasp the extent of YOUR impact and are inspired to continue your commitment to fostering unparalleled education for Mercer Island's students. Your support bridges the chasm between state funding and the District's educational requisites, propelling equity, innovation, and resources that amplify student triumphs.




Teacher Enrichment

The Mercer Island Schools Foundation annually provides teacher grants to foster classroom creativity and innovation. During the 2022-23 academic year, the MISF allocated \$85,000 in grants, benefiting 63 teachers.

Dedicated to supporting innovative educators, the Mercer Island Schools Foundation empowers teachers with grants that enable students to develop skills, discover passions, and create a learning spark that fosters a well-rounded education.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL Toymaker Workshop

This Foundation-funded grant has facilitated the Toymaker and former teacher Rick Hartman's visit to Island Park Elementary. Rick introduced a captivating toy-making workshop tailored for 2nd graders. Aligned with the second-grade curriculum, which includes a science unit centered around materials and their applications, the Toymaker's involvement added a significant dimension to the learning experience.

In this unit, students discussed material properties, the transformations materials undergo when heat or cold, and the concept of material recycling and reusability. The Toymaker's visit was the culmination of this materials-focused curriculum. During this concluding activity, each student enthusiastically participated in crafting a "toy" boat using handmade hammers, nails, and a wind-up propeller.

Following the boat-making process, the students conducted hands-on tests of their creations in water-filled buckets within the classroom environment. This testing phase prompted necessary adjustments and modifications to enhance boat performance. Many resourceful students incorporated sails and adjusted weights, which required thoughtful design and repetitive testing.

Adding a layer of educational enjoyment to the experience, Mr. Hartman engaged with the second graders in discussions regarding the specific properties of the materials employed in the project. Additionally, he delved

into the concept of energy storage within these materials. The boats, a testament to the student's creativity and craftsmanship, were sent home, encouraging ongoing exploration and discovery.

Overall, the Toymaker's involvement was an engaging and enriching enhancement to the 2nd-grade curriculum. It fostered a deeper understanding of materials, their attributes, and practical applications, sparking imaginative thinking and hands-on learning.



HIGH SCHOOL Construction of Stirling Engines

Mercer Island High School Students in Rita Harvey's Physics 2 and Chemistry 2 classes engaged in a final STEM project involving the construction of Stirling Engines using everyday materials. Supported by a grant from MISF, the Stirling Engines were utilized for class presentations. Students selected the Stirling Engine after they explored various energy-conservation devices due to its versatility as an engine, refrigerator, or heat pump. The MISF grant supplied 150 students in Harvey's classes with three Stirling Engine models and necessary equipment such as brass tubing, copper pipe, steel wool, galvanized wire, glues, and balsa wood. Working in groups, students selected a model, studied its functionality, and presented their findings to peers.



Following this, students constructed their own Stirling Engines using provided materials. This initiative facilitated the practical application of STEM knowledge, hands-on physics, and engineering comprehension while enhancing public speaking and evidence-based communication skills. This endeavor allows all students, irrespective of mathematical proficiency, to demonstrate their unique strengths in physics and chemistry. This project provided the opportunity for students to showcase their STEM knowledge and participate in hands-on investigations and experimental design concepts. The students used real-time data collection to reinforce physics and engineering concepts they've learned.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL IDEA Project

The IDEA Project is a non-profit organization that provides interactive disability education awareness in schools. With custom programs tailored to each grade level, its goal is to create understanding and empathy by educating students about differences and different abilities.

The IDEA Project's program started with a group assembly. The 40-minute event was an interactive program during which students were encouraged to participate in the discussion and interactive group activities. An inspiring video showed children with different abilities doing things others might not expect

them to do. The purpose was to illustrate that although everyone is different, it is possible to find similarities and ways that everyone can participate in activities.



Individual activity stations followed the assembly, all tailored to meet the student's developmental stage and grade level. As students went from station to station, they learned how it would feel to walk in the shoes of others. Some stations included sensory processing issues, communication delays, and physical impairments. The goal was to create awareness and compassion by educating students about differences, different abilities and to foster an understanding in typical peers of how their friends with disabilities navigate their lives.

Foundation-Funded Curriculum Initiatives Strengthening Student Success

Both of these innovative curricula underscore the commitment of Mercer Island to providing high-quality education, ensuring that every student has the tools and resources needed to succeed academically.

The introduction of iReady Math, a Foundation-funded curriculum, has significantly impacted elementary education in Mercer Island. Through generous contributions from the local community, students can access a world-class, comprehensive, and adaptive learning platform that caters to individual needs and enhances mathematical proficiency. Implementing iReady Math has enriched classroom instruction and empowered teachers with valuable insights into student progress, allowing for targeted interventions and personalized support.



The integration of Benchmark Literacy made possible through the generous support of the Mercer Island Schools Foundation and community funding, has brought about a transformative impact on elementary education in Mercer Island. With access to this comprehensive literacy program, students have the necessary skills to become proficient readers and critical thinkers. Supported by engaging resources and research-based strategies, Benchmark Literacy has revitalized classroom instruction, fostering a love for reading and enhancing comprehension abilities. With Benchmark Literacy, teachers have the tools to effectively differentiate instruction and provide tailored support, ensuring every student receives the attention they need to excel.

MISF 2022-23 Student Ambassadors – Silas Burkey, Julia Harper and Nathan Wen

Renn Novak is the recipient of the 2023 MISF Penny Yantis Scholarship

This scholarship is granted to a MISD senior who demonstrates how a Mercer Island Schools Foundation program has impacted or inspired them during their time in the District.

Renn struggled immensely with her identity at the beginning of high school. Growing up as a queer student and trying to navigate mental health issues proved challenging. Through her involvement in the MIHS radio class and with the support of Joe Bryant, the KMIH general manager and radio program teacher, she found her place and voice in the community. Renn started to think about the type of content she wanted to produce and immediately knew she wanted to create a radio show that emulated kindness. Nervous about putting this raw version of herself on air, the support she received from Joe allowed her the freedom and confidence to pursue self-authenticity. Renn started her first podcast, The Tides Show, a commentary on her life as a queer young adult and educator on advocacy and mental health. In return, she was greeted with encouragement and a desire to uplift her voice. It was at that point she realized she had something important to say. More essentially, people were willing to listen.



Through this, Renn and many others have learned that their stories are worth sharing. This model of assistance that the Mercer Island Schools Foundation has set up has influenced the way students seek the community that will support the next generation of change.

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I give to the Mercer Island Schools Foundation because I want our kids to have the best education possible, which requires an investment of time and resources from parents and grandparents and members of the community. Our teachers and staff and administration work extremely hard to ensure that our kids are learning in their classrooms, but they are limited in what they can do by the city and state's budget allocations. As parents and community members, we can increase the funding available for enrichment, new curriculums and special programs and we can make a significant impact on the level of learning resources and tools that our available in our classrooms.



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Fourteen years ago, we moved to Mercer Island so that our preschooler (and later, his brother) could start kindergarten in the Mercer Island School District. That preschooler graduated from Mercer Island High School in June and we are confident that his Mercer Island education prepared him for success in college. Our two sons are fairly similar academically, but have widely different interests and socio-emotional needs. Programs to address those interests and needs would be considered “extras” in many school districts. On Mercer Island, they are essentials. It is exactly those types of programs the Mercer Island Schools Foundation helps fund, and we feel fortunate to have sent our kids to schools with such incredible community support.

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
